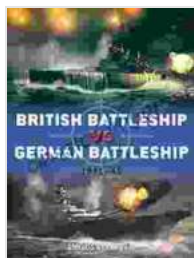

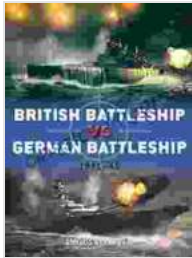
Today, the wrecks of Bismarck and Hood lie on the seabed of the Atlantic Ocean, silent reminders of the price paid in the quest for naval supremacy.

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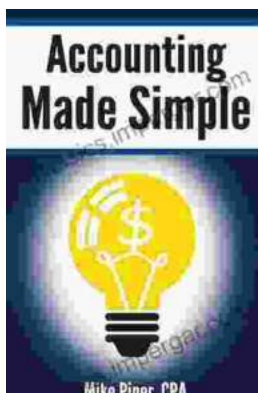
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
